Mentor Texts for Schema (Ideas)

Johnson, J. (2020). Help wanted: Must love books. (C. Dawson, Illus.). North Mankato, MN: Capstone.

Shailey enjoys snuggling up her dad for a bedtime read aloud until he gets a new job and is too busy. So, she fires her dad and posts a help wanted sign. She is thrilled when her favorite traditional tale characters apply but after Snow White's dwarfs accuse her of being the wicked queen and the gingerbread man runs away with the book, Shailey figures out she needs to add more criteria to her sign. Each time a new applicant fails to meet her standards, she revises her sign until she realizes that only one person can fill the position. The back matter includes "resumes" for applicants like Pinocchio and The Frog Prince.

Marcero, D. (2020). In a jar. New York, NY: Putnam.

Llewellyn and Evelyn collect everything imaginable. Throughout the seasons, they fill their jars with memorable moments and much more. When Evelyn tells Llewellyn she is moving away, his jar feels empty until the two collectors figure out a way to share memories across the miles.

Denos, J. Here and now. (E. B. Goodale, Illus.). New York, NY: HMH Books for Young Readers.

A book that celebrates the connections that we have between ourselves, books, and the world around us. Through beautiful illustrations and text, the reader is drawn into a story where the small moments are acknowledged that build the bridge on understanding of texts and people.

Mentor Texts for Relationships (Connections)

Ferry, B. (2020). Swashby and the sea. (J. Martinez-Neal, Illus.). Boston, MA: HMH.

Captain Swashby is enjoying his quiet seaside retirement until a young girl and her granny move in next door. Swashby scratches messages like "No Trespassing" and "Please Go Away" into the sand, but the waves fiddle with his words changing their meaning. With a little help from his lively new neighbor and his old friend the sea, Swashby discovers that life is more enjoyable when you're in the company of others.

Springstubb, T. (2020). *Khalil and Mr. Hagerty and the backyard treasures.* (E. Taherian, Illus.). Somerville, MA: Candlewick.

Khalil lives in a noisy apartment above Mr. Hagerty's quiet one. Both neighbors enjoy the backyard. As they share the space, Mr. Hagerty helps Khalil read words while Khalil helps Mr. Hagerty remember them. One summer morning, Mr. Hagerty notices his garden is droopy and Khalil is disappointed that he hasn't found any treasure. That evening, they each secretly plant something for the other to find.

Elliot, Z. (2020). A place inside of me: A poem to heal the heart. (N. Shannon, Illus.). New York, NY: Farrar, Straus, & Giroux.

A young boy shares his feelings through a powerful poem as he moves through a year that changes his life and his emotions forever. He chronicles moments of joy until his community is deeply wounded by a police shooting.
